Watertown	Watertown	Wacousta	Named for Watertown, NY in 1837; Also early name for Wacousta prior from 1837-1939
Waverly	Eagle	Hinman and Grand River Roads	Replaced by Eagle to the west

Westphalia	Westphalia		Founded 1838; Village incorporated in 1883.
Williamsport	Greenbush	Eureka	First name of Eureka; See also Barrington, Swizzletown, Greenbush
